1. PASSAGE:

Africa could be labeled as the supplier of mostly unprocessed products to the world. It is crystal clear that the continent in its every part has the potential to provide the most important resources to the globe. One cannot deny that Africa still has untapped natural resources and human resources even after the long and bloody experience of civilization. It is the argument of the writer that the Africa we want can be materialized through intra- continental trade integration. Such a move, according to many commentators, is believed to help the continent to take the place it deserves.

Needless to say, continents, apart from Africa, especially those in the northern hemisphere, have developed a special type of system that unites one another and fosters their development in every aspect. These continents have exerted their efforts to achieve their goals though Africa could not achieve what the rest of the continents have accomplished; it is undeniable that Africa has sacrificed its opportunities for the sake of the rest to prosper uninterruptedly. It was a chewy route for Africa to find its way to success. It is the fact that in order to change the course of the system, African nations have designed special strategies to achieve their vision to create Africa we want through the agenda 2030 and Agenda 2063 of the African Union. In this long- term agenda, African nations, through their leaders have signed multiple agreements to meet the desired goals.

Some of the notable measures that followed those multiple agreements are the points of focus of this paragraph. In this respect, contrary to the previous way of doing trade, the report noted that Africa has taken tangible actions to secure greater intra- continental trade including the adoption of an action plan to boost intra- African trade and the agreement ratified by the states. In addition the ratified agreement will open the door to eliminate 90% of tariffs in goods. It is also expected to liberalize trade in services gradually, and to create a single African market of one billion consumers with a total gross domestic product of more than 3 trillion. Such tangible actions will bring additional benefits to the people of Africa including job creation and economic growth. Again, the above benefits will unlock the long awaited continent's sustainable industrialization and development. Moreover, in recent years, regional economic partnerships have been strengthened. Accordingly, the Tripartite Free Trade Area, which incorporates three regional economic communities namely, COMESA, EAC and SADC, was officially launched in June 2015 in Sharm el- Sheikh Egypt with the aim of fostering integration and helping member states to circumvent the challenges arising from overlapping memberships in regional economic communities. As of July 2022, there were 22 signatories to the Tripartite Free Trade Area Agreement among the 29 states of the three regional communities, and 11 states had ratified it. Three additional ratifications are required to operationalize the Tripartite Free Trade Area.

Answer: C

The writer states his aim inside the passage: *It is the argument of the writer that the Africa we want can be materialized through intra-continental trade integration.* Everything after that sentence supports the same argument.

A and D are true details, but they are used as support, not as the purpose. B is never said in the passage.

Rule: For a main purpose question, find the sentence where the writer says what he is arguing, then check that the rest of the text supports it.

2. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

Which of the following would be the best replacement for the word chewy in paragraph 2 of this passage?

A. ✓ **tough**

B. sickening

C. boring

D. inaccessible

Answer: A

Food that is chewy is hard work to eat. The writer uses the word for a road, so he means the way to success was hard.

tough carries the same idea of something difficult. Boring is about being dull, and sickening is about disgust, so neither matches a hard journey.

Rule: When a word is used outside its normal area (food word used for a road), keep the feeling of the word and drop the literal meaning.

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QUESTION:

In paragraph 1 line 1 the writer says 'Africa could be labeled as the supplier of mostly unprocessed products to the world.' Which word do you think best describes the where about of Africa in the global economy?

Answer: C

The line says Africa mostly sells products that are not processed. Selling raw materials instead of manufactured goods is the old way of trading.

traditional names that old economic role. Destitute means extremely poor, which the passage denies, because it says Africa is rich in untapped resources.

4. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

The title Creating the Africa We Want implies

- B. Africa is in the way we aspire it to be.
- C. Economic integration endeavors are taken place in Africa.

Answer: D

The word *Creating* in the title means the Africa we want does not exist yet and has to be built. The last paragraph says every stake holder and the people of Africa must work for the unified goals.

D carries both parts: the joint work, and the result. A is close, but it drops the condition of who must do the work, which is exactly what the title implies.

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QUESTION:

The underlined word circumvent in the fourth paragraph most nearly means

A. ✓ **beat**

B. win

C. ignore

D. abandon

Answer: A

To circumvent a problem is to find a way round it and get past it. In the passage, member states want to get past the trouble caused by belonging to several regional groups at once.

beat keeps that sense of overcoming. Ignore is wrong because the states are dealing with the problem, not paying no attention to it.

6. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In the last paragraph of the passage the writer says, 'to achieve what has been planned and see the Africa we want, every stake holder, coupled with the people of Africa, must work for the unified goals.' which of the following statements would the above quotation most likely support?

- A. Stake holders are working closely with the people of Africa.
- B. The writer thinks the Africa he wants will materialize sooner than later.
- C. ✓ **A concerted effort from all concerned bodies is mandatory if Africa is to develop as desired.**
- D. Without integration, Africa will remain poor.

Answer: C

The quotation has two parts: *every stake holder, coupled with the people of Africa* (everybody together) and *must work* (a requirement).

C repeats both parts: a joint effort, and it is mandatory. A turns it into a fact that is already happening, but the writer is calling for it, not reporting it.

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QUESTION:

In Paragraph 1, line 6, the phrase 'such a move' refers to:

Answer: B

A phrase like *such a move* points back to the idea in the sentence just before it. That sentence says the Africa we want can be materialized through intra-continental trade integration.

C and D repeat earlier sentences that are further away, so they are too far back to be the reference.

Rule: this, that, such + noun normally refer to the nearest idea already mentioned.

8. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In paragraph 4, what expression has the writer used to show that he wants to add a point or information to what he has said in paragraph 3.

A. besides

B. furthermore

C. in addition

D. ✓ moreover

Answer: D

Paragraph 4 begins with **Moreover**, and that word tells the reader another point is being added to paragraph 3.

Besides, furthermore and in addition also add information in general English, but the question asks what the writer actually used. Only *Moreover* opens paragraph 4. In addition appears inside paragraph 3, so it is not the link between the two paragraphs.

9. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In paragraph two the phrase 'These continents' refers to

Answer: B

The sentence before says: *continents, apart from Africa, especially those in the northern hemisphere*. So the phrase covers the non African continents, above all the northern ones.

A and D are wrong because Africa is excluded. C drops the words *especially those in the northern hemisphere*, so it is wider than what the text says.

10. PASSAGE:

QUESTION:

The term intra- continental trade implies

Answer: A

The prefix **intra** means inside or within, while **inter** means between different ones. So intra-continental trade is trade inside one continent, that is, among African countries themselves.

B and C describe trade with other continents, which is inter-continental. D limits it to only two countries, but the passage speaks of a single African market.

Rule: intra means within (intra-African), inter means between (international).

11. PASSAGE:

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Her problem was, Black more said it took a while to get used to so many people in one place, all of whom seemed like they were moving at warp speed. 'There are only 18 million people in Australia spread out over an entire country,' she says, 'compared to more than six million people in the state of Massachusetts alone. We don't have the kind of congestion you have in Boston. There is a whole different perception of space.'

The pressing problem for Blackmore was making a quick adjustment to the American life style that felt like it was run by a stopwatch. For this easygoing Australian, Americans seemed like perpetual- motion machines. Americans are very time oriented, Blackmore says, 'Everything is done according to a schedule.' They are always busy, which made me feel guilty about wanting to just sit around and occasionally watch television. Australians, on the other hand, value their leisure time. The pace there is a lot slower because we don't feel the need to always be busy. It is not that Australians are lazy; it is just that they have a different concept of how time should be spent. Back home, I used to spend a lot more time...

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QUESTION:

Which of the following statements is False of the city of Boston?

- A. Life in Boston is so hectic.
- B. ✓ **People in Boston value their leisure time.**
- C. Drivers in Boston usually sit in the left side while they are driving.
- D. In Boston people are usually well scheduled.

Answer: B

The question asks which statement is **not** true of Boston. Paragraph 4 says Americans are always busy, and that it is the Australians, not the Americans, who value their leisure time. So B is the false one.

C is true: she says the steering wheel was on the wrong side for her, and that in Australia it is on the right, so in Boston the driver sits on the left. A and D are supported by paragraphs 2 and 4.

12. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

Which of the following would be the best title for this passage?

- A. The amazing side of the city of Boston
- B. The hectic life of Boston versus the serene nature of Melbourne
- C. ✓ **Culture shock**
- D. Tamara Blackmore

Answer: C

The first sentence already names the topic: Tamara experienced culture shock. Every paragraph after it shows one part of that shock: the traffic, the crowding, the fast pace.

D is only the name of a person, and A and B cover single details. A title must cover the whole passage.

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QUESTION:

Which of the following organizational schemes is most prevalent in the passage?

- A. Chronological order
- B. Order by topic
- C. Hierarchical order
- D. ✓ **Order of contrast**

Answer: D

Almost every paragraph sets one place against the other: Boston traffic against Australian traffic, Boston crowds against a thinly settled Australia, American schedules against Australian leisure.

That is organisation by contrast. It is not chronological, because the writer does not tell events in the order they happened.

Rule: Words like *on the other hand*, *compared to* and *different* signal a contrast pattern.

14. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

Which of the following best expresses the main idea of the passage?

- A. Living in a community other than where one was brought up could be a fascinating experience.
- B. Tamara Blackmore is a lucky girl who happened to enjoy life in two cities.
- C. ✓ **Culture shock could be as traumatizing as is illustrated through a girl called Tamara Blackmore.**
- D. Boston College has gone out of its way to create a memorable experience for Blackmore and its other exchange students.

Answer: C

The passage uses one student's story to show how hard culture shock can be. The writer even says it was more like culture trauma.

A is too general and too positive, B misses the difficulty, and D is only the last detail of the text. The main idea has to hold the whole passage together.

15. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In the second paragraph of the passage, which of the following points of differences between the cities of Boston and Melbourne is mainly dealt with?

- A. Perception concerning space
- B. ✓ **The hectic nature of life**
- C. The way time is managed
- D. Reading about the cities and experiencing them

Answer: B

Paragraph 2 is the one about landing in Boston: the tension in the air, the crazy driving, and a life style far more hectic than the one she left.

Space is dealt with in paragraph 3, time management in paragraph 4, and reading against experiencing in paragraph 1.

16. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

What is the closest meaning of the underlined word understatement in the first paragraph?

A. Exaggeration

B. ✓ **Underrating**

C. Distortion

D. Hyperbole

Answer: B

An understatement says less than the truth. The writer proves it in the next line: calling it culture shock is too weak, because it was more like culture trauma.

Underrating means giving something a lower value than it deserves, so it matches. Exaggeration and hyperbole are the opposite, and distortion means twisting the facts.

17. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In the first paragraph, the writer has used the expression a sea of difference to

- A. show that the discrepancies in life style between Boston and Melbourne cities are so great.
- B. show that the gap in life styles between Boston and Melbourne cities is so narrow.

Answer: C

Read the sentence the phrase sits in: *Blackmore discovered first hand that there is a sea of difference between reading about and experiencing America first hand.* The sea of difference is between reading and experiencing, and C says exactly that.

A and D both say the same thing in different words, that Boston and Melbourne differ greatly. Two options with one meaning cannot both be the answer, so neither of them is the key. B says the gap is narrow, which is the opposite.

Rule: For a phrase in context question, answer from the sentence the phrase is in, not from the topic of the whole passage.

18. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

The underlined word congestion in paragraph three refers to

- A. freedom.
- B. ✓ **overcrowding.**
- C. relationship.
- D. problems.

Answer: B

Congestion means too many people or vehicles packed into one place. The sentence sets 18 million people spread over a whole country against more than six million in one American state.

overcrowding matches that. Freedom is the opposite feeling, and problems is far too general.

19. PASSAGE:

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QUESTION:

In paragraph four the word 'they' in a heavy print refers to

Answer: A

Look at the sentences around it: *Americans are very time oriented* and *Everything is done according to a schedule. They are always busy.* The nearest plural noun that fits is the Americans.

It cannot be the Australians, because the next sentence sets them against this group with *on the other hand*.

Rule: A pronoun points to the nearest noun before it that agrees in number and makes sense.

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QUESTION:

Blackmore would probably agree that

- A. Americans are more sophisticated drivers than their Australian counterparts.
- B. ✓ **Americans are more time oriented and they keep themselves busy.**
- C. Americans are more generous than their Australian counterparts.
- D. Americans are more easygoing and socially active than Australians.

Answer: B

Blackmore's own words are quoted: Americans are very time oriented, everything is done according to a schedule, and they are always busy.

She never praises their driving, so A fails, and she says nothing about generosity. D is the opposite of her view, because she calls herself the easygoing one.

21. Dr Getachew gave us a good lecture yesterday, and I wish you had been present. (1)
- A. The fact that Dr Getachew would give us a good lecture was in my wish and accordingly he gave us lecture which you were able to attend.
- B. Dr Getachew was able to deliver us a nice lecture yesterday that was indeed as per my dream, and the fact that you attended it was nice of you.
- C. ✓ **We were given an interesting lecture yesterday by Dr. Getachew, but unfortunately you missed it.**
- D. It was in my wish that Dr. Getachew could have given us a good lecture and you could have attended it, but neither of you did so.

Answer: C

Two facts are packed into the sentence. First, the lecture was good and it did take place. Second, *I wish you had been present* means you were not there.

C keeps both: a good lecture happened, and the listener missed it. A says the listener attended, and D says the lecture never happened, so both change the facts.

Rule: wish + past perfect (had been) talks about a past fact the speaker is sorry about, so the opposite is what really happened. See Grade 12 English, Unit 9, verb patterns with wish.

22. All the students, but Shemsu had already finalized the project by the time the instructor asked them to submit it. (1)
- A. **Except Shemsu who did not complete his project assignment, the rest were ready to submit it when asked to do so by their instructor.**
- B. By the time the instructor asked his students to submit their project work, with the exception of Shemsu, who completed it on time, all the rest were not ready for submission.
- C. Neither Shemsu nor the rest of his class mates were ready to submit their project by the time their instructor requested them to do so.
- D. Both Shemsu and his class mates had already finished their assignment and submitted the same following an order from their instructor.

Answer: A

Here **but** does not mean however. After a word like *all*, but means *except*. So all the students except Shemsu had finished.

B turns it around and says only Shemsu finished. C says nobody finished, and D says everybody did.

Rule: all, everyone, nobody + but = except that one person.

23. The president her speech of unity to both houses on the joint meeting of the House of Peoples Representatives and the House of Federation last week. (1)

Answer: A

English pairs the verb **deliver** with the noun *speech*: you deliver a speech, a lecture or a message.

Inaugurate means to open something officially, such as a building or a project. Accentuate means to make something stand out, and provision means to supply goods.

Rule: Learn verbs and nouns as pairs: deliver a speech, hold a meeting, take a decision.

24. As is documented in historic archives, Ethiopia was at the of its development stage during the Axumite Empire. It (1)
is the argument of many quarters at present that the major task of this generation is to take Ethiopia back to its
place of hegemony.

A. verge

B. normalcy

C. pace

D. ✓ **peak**

Answer: D

The **peak** of something is its highest point. The next sentence supports it, because it says the task now is to take Ethiopia back to its place of hegemony, that is, back to the top.

On the verge of means just before something starts, so it would say the opposite about the Axumite period.

25. According to the Ethiopian Metrological Agency's weather Addis Ababa is expected to have a wet and cloudy (1)
weather condition in the coming couple of days.

A. prediction

B. ✓ **forecast**

C. speculation

D. condition

Answer: B

A statement about the weather of the coming days is a weather **forecast**. It is the fixed word used by weather agencies.

Prediction is a general word for saying what will happen, and speculation is a guess with little evidence. The sentence names a metrological agency, so the technical word is needed.

26. According to a recent report by the United Nations Development Agency countries are expected to enhance (1)
their effort in reducing the gap in gender in all aspects of life.

A. roles

B. ✓ **inequalities**

C. conflicts

D. bias

Answer: B

Development reports speak about closing the gap of **gender inequalities**, that is, the unfair differences between men and women in school, work and income.

Roles are simply the jobs each group does, and no country tries to reduce a gap in conflicts. Bias is an attitude in one person's mind, so it does not fit the phrase *in all aspects of life*.

27. There happened a terrible accident yesterday after a minibus taxi collided with a 'Sino truck' on the express way (1)
from Addis to Adama. In the accident while two of the passengers immediately died, around thirteen travellers
were heavily

D. wounded

Answer: C

People who are hurt in a road accident are **injured**. That is the word news reports use for crashes and falls.

Wounded is normally kept for a cut made by a weapon in fighting. Bruised is only a mark on the skin, which is far too light for a crash that killed two people, and damaged is used for things, never for people.

Rule: injure people in accidents, wound people with weapons, damage things.

- 28.** As is argued by many, one does not have to himself/herself with those individuals who do not have any role in adding value to what he/she does. (1)

- D. bring

Answer: A

To **associate with** somebody is to keep company with them. The sentence advises you not to keep company with people who add no value to your work.

Mix would need *mix with* without a reflexive pronoun, and live and bring make no sense with *himself/herself with*.

- 29.** Ato Kebede, as many friends of him witness, is known for accomplishing any task assigned to him efficiently and timely promise. He is a person whom everybody admires for such quality of him. (1)
- A. kind B. confident
C. ✓ reliable D. promising

Answer: C

Ato Kebede finishes every task well, on time and as he promised. A person like that is **reliable**, someone others can depend on.

Promising is used for a young person who may do well later, which is not the point here, and kind and confident say nothing about finishing work on time.

- 30.** Kediri, though his friends are criticizing his plan of opening his own business with 10 branches in the coming six months as looks to be very much optimistic about the realization of his dream. (1)
- A. fictitious
B. suspicious
C. frivolous
D. ✓ ambitious

Answer: D

Ten branches in six months is a very big target, so the friends criticise the plan as **ambitious**. Kedir still believes it will happen, which fits a big but not impossible plan.

Fictitious means invented and untrue, and frivolous means silly and not serious. Neither matches a business plan he is working on.

31. The world economy, according to projections from the World Bank and IMF, might by 0.02% from where it was last year. (1)

B. minimize

D. ✓ diminish

Answer: D

The blank needs a verb that means *become smaller* and that can stand without an object. **diminish** does that: the economy might diminish by 0.02%.

Minimize and belittle need an object (you minimize costs, you belittle a person), and narrow is used for width, such as a road or a gap.

32. Thanks to the tangible measures the Ministry of Health has taken with regard to family health and planning, there has been a sharp decline in maternal and infant mortality. (1)

A. serious

B. ✓ **steep**

C. steady

D. expensive

Answer: B

The word to be replaced is *sharp* in *a sharp decline*. The underlining was lost when this paper was copied, so read it as a word substitution item.

A **steep** decline is a big fall in a short time, which is what sharp means here. Steady is the opposite, because it means slow and even, and expensive and serious do not describe the shape of a fall.

Rule: steep, sharp and dramatic describe a fast change; steady, gradual and slight describe a slow one.

33. The moment he entered the compound, the stranger was attacked by the dogs. (1)

A. cornered

B. chastised

C. ✓ **set on**

D. dismantled

Answer: C

The word being replaced is *attacked*. The phrasal verb **set on** means to attack somebody suddenly, and it is the normal expression for dogs: the dogs set on him.

Cornered only means trapped in a corner, chastised means punished or scolded, and dismantled is used for taking a machine apart.

34. I found the man's handwriting to be somehow difficult to read. As a result, I had to return the text to him to rewrite it in a readable manner. (1)

A. ✓ **illegible**

B. unconvincing

C. unclear

D. tasking

Answer: A

Handwriting that cannot be read is **illegible**. The sentence proves it, because the writer sent the text back to be rewritten in a readable way.

Unclear is close, but it is a general word for anything confusing, while illegible is the exact word for writing you cannot read. Remember legible means readable, and the prefix il means not.

35. As Ethiopians, the fact that we have never been colonized is among the many reasons that would make us feel very much of being Ethiopians. (1)

A. initiated

B. motivated

C. ✓ **proud**

D. encouraged

Answer: C

Never being colonised is a reason for national pride, so the missing adjective is **proud**, and it takes the preposition *of*: proud of being Ethiopians.

Motivated and encouraged would need a purpose after them (motivated to do something), and initiated means started or introduced into a group.

Rule: proud of + noun or of + ing. See Grade 12 English, Unit 7, National Pride.

36. In any nation building endeavor, being of the interests of a wide range of people, things, ideas etc., is believed to be the most crucial factor to lasting peace and harmony. (1)
- A. tolerant
B. mutual
C. mandatory
D. ✓ **inclusive**

Answer: D

The sentence talks about taking in the interests of a wide range of people and ideas. The adjective for that is **inclusive**, and it is followed by *of*.

Tolerant of would mean only putting up with others, which is weaker than including them. Mutual describes something shared by two sides, and mandatory means required by law.

37. The man was found guilty and sentenced to a ten year of rigorous imprisonment and of his rights of participating in any election as both a voter and a candidate for 5 years after his release from jail. (1)

Answer: A

Confiscation is used for property that is seized, not for rights. Neglect means failing to care for something, and approval is the opposite of a punishment.

Answer: B

Answer: A

The speaker has prepared and now states a belief about a result that is still ahead, so the simple future **will succeed** is right.

Have succeeded would mean the exam is already over, and am succeeding describes something in progress right now. Will be succeeding is a continuous form, which does not suit a single future result.

Rule: Use will + base verb for a belief or prediction about the future.

40. countries were ranked 1-10 as the most peaceful? (1)

B. Whose

D. ✓ **Which**

Answer: D

The ranking gives a fixed, limited list, positions 1 to 10, so the question word that chooses from a known set is **Which**.

What is used when the choice is open and unlimited. In which would need a place or group after it (in which region), and Whose asks about an owner.

Rule: Which for a limited set, What for an open one.

Might be weakens the warning to a small chance, could have been talks about a past that did not happen, and will have been needs a later time point to look back from.

46. By the time one of the strikers of the Ethiopian national football team scored the last goal in the penalty shootout, the cheers and applause from the spectators like a thunder. (1)

A. heard
B. felt
C. ✓ **sounded**
D. looked

Answer: C

Cheers reach us through the ears, so the verb of perception must be **sounded**: they sounded like thunder.

Looked is for the eyes, and felt is for touch. Heard is wrong here because the spectators' cheers do not hear anything; a person hears, a noise sounds.

Rule: look like for sight, sound like for hearing, feel like for touch, all followed by a noun.

47. No one should abuse his/her power over others. (1)

Answer: B

What follows the blank is a noun (*others*), not a verb. Only **for** can come straight before a noun.

To, in order to and so as to all show purpose, but each one needs a base verb after it, for example *in order to harm others*. With no verb there, they are ungrammatical.

Rule: for + noun, but to, in order to and so as to + base verb.

Answer: B

After the verb *be*, the name of an activity is given as a gerund, the ing form. So the complement is **swimming**.

The subject is *one of my favourite sports*, a noun phrase, and a gerund balances it as another noun. The infinitive *to swim* would be used to talk about an intention, not a sport as a thing. See Grade 12 English, Unit 5, gerunds, infinitives and participles.

49. The number of students taking this year's national exam is that of last year. The figure is constantly increasing every year. (1)

Answer: C

The second sentence says the figure keeps rising every year, so this year's number is bigger than last year's. That gives **greater than**.

Fewer than and less than say the opposite, and lesser than is not used in this comparison at all. Note also that we say a greater or smaller *number*, not a more or fewer number.

50. you stop your being promiscuous, your chance of being affected by sexually transmitted diseases will be so high. (1)

Answer: B

Unless means *if not*. Read it that way: if you do not stop this behaviour, your risk will be very high. That is the warning the sentence intends.

If would flip the meaning and say the risk is high when you stop, which is nonsense. Should and could cannot open this clause with the plain present verb *stop*.

Rule: unless = if not, so never add another *not* after it.

51. The Wall of Harar in the 16th century. (1)

Answer: D

The wall did not build itself, so the sentence is passive, and *in the 16th century* is a finished past time. Simple past passive is was/were + past participle, so **was built**.

Were built needs a plural subject, has been built cannot go with a finished past time, and was being built would describe the work still going on at that moment. See Grade 12 English, Unit 8, active and passive voice.

52. her being late for the exam, the invigilator did not prevent her from taking it. (1)

B. Despite the fact that

C. Even though

D. Even if

Answer: A

What follows the blank is a noun phrase, *her being late for the exam*, with no subject and finite verb. Only a preposition can stand before it, and that is **In spite of**.

Even though, even if and despite the fact that all need a full clause after them, for example *even though she was late*.

Rule: in spite of and despite + noun or ing form; although and even though + subject and verb.

Check the relative pronoun in each sentence. A uses *which* for an animal, which is correct, and the rest of the sentence holds together.

B uses *who* for a bar, but a place or thing takes *which* or *that*. C uses *whom* as the subject of the clause, where the subject form is needed. D puts *that* after a comma, but a clause set off by commas takes *which*, never *that*. See Grade 12 English, Unit 6, relative pronouns.

59. It was his endurance that the famous athlete Haile Gebreselassie break over twenty five records in his middle and long distance running. (1)

Answer: D

The verb here is followed by an object and then the bare infinitive *break*, with no *to*. The verb that takes that pattern and means *caused* is **made**.

Allowed needs the full infinitive (allowed him to break), and makes is present tense while the sentence is about the past. Let also takes a bare infinitive, but it means gave permission, which endurance cannot do.

Rule: make somebody do something (no to), but allow somebody to do something.

B puts the material before the condition (*jeans tattered trousers*), and C and D break the adjectives apart into clauses that describe the wrong thing, so the trousers end up short and thin instead of the man.

Rule: opinion, size, shape, age, colour, origin, material, then the noun.

Answer: B

After *became* we need an adjective, and the adjective that takes *of* is **afraid**: afraid of it.

Rule: afraid of, frightened by, shocked at. Learn the adjective with its preposition.

Answer: C

The obligation comes from outside the speaker: a meeting was announced and everyone has been urged not to miss it. For an outside rule English prefers **have to**.

Must is used when the speaker himself imposes the duty, and should would only give advice. Do not have to means there is no obligation at all, which contradicts the sentence.

Rule: have to = the rule comes from outside; must = the speaker's own decision.

63. Mr. Gole looks usually presentable with his dressing style. As an instance the white shirts he casually wears make him gorgeous. (1)

Answer: C

The blank needs an adverb before the adjective *gorgeous*, and that is **quite**, meaning fairly or completely.

Watch the spelling trap: *quiet* means silent and is an adjective, while *quite* is the adverb of degree. Unlikely and verily do not fit before an adjective in this sentence.

Rule: quite = fairly or completely; quiet = making no noise.

64. The refugees from neighboring Somalia temporal at Dollo-Ado refugee camp for a few months. (1)

Answer: D

The refugees came some months ago and are still in the camp, and the sentence gives the length of time with *for a few months*. That calls for the present perfect continuous, **have been sheltering**.

Had been sheltering would need a second past event to look back from, and were sheltering would mean they are no longer there. Are sheltering alone cannot carry *for a few months*.

Rule: An action that started in the past and still continues takes have/has been + ing with for or since.

65. our economy is showing a tremendous progress, the fact that there are millions of citizens whose livelihood is below the doldrums of poverty compels us to accelerate our fight against destitution and wretchedness. (1)

Answer: D

The two halves of the sentence pull against each other: the economy is improving, yet millions are still poor. So the link must show contrast, and **Despite** is the standard one.

Despite of is always wrong, because despite already includes the idea of *of*. However is not used to open such a clause, it joins sentences.

Note on this copy: the printed clause after the blank has its own subject and verb, so strictly a clause connector such as *although* would be needed, and *In spite of* would work exactly like *Despite* before a noun phrase. Answer the item as the examiner intended, using despite plus a noun phrase.

Rule: despite and in spite of + noun or ing; although and even though + subject and verb.

66. I remember quite well what the anti- Apartheid icon Nelson Mandela once said ' Africans are sinking, the rest of the world is letting them sink. When someone lets you sink, you must learn how to swim.' (1)

Answer: C

The two facts happen at the same time and point in opposite directions: Africans are sinking, and at the same moment the rest of the world watches. **while** carries both the time and the contrast.

Even though would make the second half a concession, which changes the meaning, and *on the contrary* is used to correct a false statement. Note also that *where as* is not a word; it is written as one word, *whereas*.

See Grade 12 English, Unit 4, adverbial clauses of time (as, just as, while, as soon as).

67. Ms. Letay with the Ministry of Revenue for the last ten years.

Answer: A

For the last ten years means the work started in the past and is still going on now, so the present perfect **has been** is right.

Had been would need another past moment to look back from, and was would close the job in the past. Is cannot be used with *for the last ten years*.

68. Patient: Hi Madam, I would like to see the physician. Can you help me please? Receptionist: Patient: Yap. I am Terfasa.

- A. Whom do you want please?
B. Sorry! Can you tell me what his name is please?

Answer: C

The patient answers *I am Terfasa*, so the missing line must ask for his name in a polite way. That is C.

A asks which person he wants, and B asks for the doctor's name, neither of which fits the answer given. D offers a seat, and no name would follow it.

Rule: Formal writing avoids short forms and slang, and uses titles such as Mr., Mrs. and Dr.

70. Tadelech: Look over there! Is that part of the plane that got crushed at Bishoftu some years back? Nejat: No, it can't be part of a plane. It

Rule: For something finished before a future time, use will have + past participle.

Ezra asks *when*, so the reply must give a time or a condition. A answers with a condition: whenever she has enough money.

B uses the future perfect where a simple future is needed, C sets an impossible order of events, and D uses *unless* where *until* is meant.

74. Andargachew: You are casually dressed. Your neck tie goes with your shirt. Where is it from? Dilamo: (1)

- A. ✓ **Thanks dear, it is from Turkey.**
- B. Great. It is made from cotton.
- C. Wow, it is quite medium in size.

Answer: A

The question is *Where is it from?*, so the answer must name a place. Only A does: it is from Turkey.

B answers what it is made of, C answers about size, and D answers a yes or no question that was never asked.

Rule: Match the answer to the question word: where takes a place, what takes a thing, when takes a time.

75. Estifanos: Sarah, what are you planning for the coming year? Sarah:

A and B switch to the advantages of marriage, and C lists a disadvantage of marriage, which is the opposite topic.

80. Hailu: Do you know that in the Gikiyo clan, somewhere in the Southern Part of Africa, the female is the figure head of her family? Asia: (1)
- A. Believe it or not, I have never heard the presence of such a clan in Africa.
 - B. Funnily enough there should be so many clans of such a type where female domination is rampant.

Answer: C

Melat says *I didn't get you*, which means she did not understand, not that she did not hear. So Venus should say the same thing in different words, as in C.

A would help only if the problem were the volume, and D asks the other person to repeat, but it is Venus who has to speak again.

Rule: Not understanding calls for rephrasing (let me put it another way); not hearing calls for repeating or speaking louder.

C gives a volume figure without any comparison, and D compares cost, not size.

Note on this copy: option A has been cut short by the scan. Read as printed, it is not a full sentence, so B is the only complete answer.

A asks a question back, B only comments on success in general, and D tells him to give up the idea instead of advising him how to do it.

86. Zuber: Zebenary: Yes, I do, because that is the only way to pull us out from our deep seated poverty. (1)

Rule: The short answer must repeat the auxiliary of the question: Do you...? Yes, I do. Are you...? Yes, I am.

A leaves out the comma between Nigeria and South Africa, B and C put the commas in the wrong places, and C also cuts the subject off from the verb with a comma.

Rule: In a series, put a comma after every item except the last.

A capitalises grandson, D lowercases Street, and B gets both wrong.

Rule: Capitalise proper nouns only, and capitalise Street, Road or Avenue when they are part of a name.

Answer: A

The sentence holds two complete ideas: Fozan has left for Jimma, and his sister has gone to Jigjiga. A semicolon is the mark that joins two complete sentences that are closely related, and A places it exactly between them.

C has no mark at all, so it is a run on sentence, while B and D drop the semicolon inside a phrase, which cuts a sentence in two.

Rule: A semicolon joins two independent clauses; it never separates a verb from its subject.

92. The bridge on the river was constructed by the C.B.R.C.

Answer: D

The problem in the stem is the abbreviation, written as *C.B.R.C.* with the full stops in the wrong places. Modern style writes the initials of an organisation with no full stops at all, so **CBRC** is the clean form.

Note on this copy: options A and C are printed with exactly the same wording, which cannot happen in a sound question, so treat the item with care.

Rule: Write abbreviations of organisations in capitals without full stops: AU, UN, CBRC.

93. on have finished assignment your working project you?

Answer: D

Put the scrambled words into the normal order of a yes or no question: auxiliary, subject, then the rest. That gives *Have you finished working on your project assignment?*

B splits the phrasal verb and leaves *on project* stranded, and C attaches *on working* to the wrong noun.

Note on this copy: option A uses the same words in a slightly different noun order and also reads correctly, so the item does not separate the two cleanly.

94. was who a theory scientist Big- Bang Stephen Hawkings the world the introduced prominent

Answer: B

Build the sentence around its subject and verb: Stephen Hawkings was a prominent scientist. Then attach the relative clause that describes him: who introduced the world to the Big Bang theory. That is B.

A and C move *the* and *a* to the wrong nouns, and D joins two verbs with no linking word, which leaves the sentence broken.

95. were the is stage that it high she time on.

Answer: D

The fixed expression is *It is high time* + subject + past form of the verb, and it means the action is already late. So the sentence is **It is high time that she were on the stage.**

The past form *were* here is not real past time; it is the unreal past, the same form used after *I wish*. The other options put *she* or *the stage* in the subject position, which breaks the expression.

96. Mr Solomon is the most dedicated teacher I have ever known for three major reasons. To begin with, he rarely comes to class without a thorough preparation on the day's lesson. Moreover, he is humorous while teaching which, in my view, a quality is that a good teacher is expected to have. The fact that he treats every student equally is the other feature of Mr Solomon that we all admire.

Answer: C

The paragraph lists three qualities of Mr Solomon. The closing sentence must follow from all three, and C does: because of them, the students want to be like him when they become teachers.

D names only one quality, being funny, and calls it the reason for everything. A and B are not correct sentences, so neither can close the paragraph.

Rule: A concluding sentence sums up every reason given, not just the last one.

97. Sharing house hold chores between a husband and wife is becoming a necessity, not an option these days. The first and perhaps the most important reason is that it is through such modeling that children in the family would grow taking a good lesson from their parents on the importance of cooperation. The other pressing need is that most women these days, like their male counterparts, have got big responsibilities that stretch from home to office. Thus, sharing the burden on the men's part is quite indispensable. What could be more is, by sharing the burden, the husband and wife would get time to share love and warmth.

- A. ✓ **In a nutshell, the present unlike the past, requires men's dedication in easing the burden of their wives.**
- B. Wrapping it up, a husband and wife are responsible for shaping their children's future.

Answer: A

The paragraph argues that sharing house work is now a necessity, and it gives three reasons. A closes with that same claim: today, unlike in the past, men must ease the burden on their wives.

B and D pick up only one of the three reasons, and C offers a proverb about children that does not sum up the argument.

98. Which of the following is spelled correctly?

Answer: A

The task is to find the word that is written correctly. As this copy stands, all four words are spelled correctly, so the item cannot be answered as printed and the recorded key A is kept only as a placeholder.

Use the item for spelling practice instead: courageous keeps the whole word *courage* and adds *ous*, decisive comes from decide, and resilient has one s and one l.

99. Which of the following is spelled correctly?

Answer: C

Two options are clearly wrong: *Chansmatic* should be charismatic, and *Agressive* needs a double g, aggressive.

Participatory is written correctly.

Note on this copy: *consultative* in option D is also spelled correctly, so as scanned the item has two acceptable answers.

Rule: Words built on a base keep the base whole: aggress plus ive, participate minus e plus ory.

100. In a formal letter which of the following could be optional?

D. ✓ **The subject heading**

Answer: D

A formal letter must carry the date, the address of the person you are writing to, and a salutation such as *Dear Mr. Kebede*. Without them the letter cannot be filed or answered.

The **subject heading**, the short line naming the topic, is helpful but not required, so it is the optional part.

101. If you happen to read a formal letter having a salutation which reads as 'Dear, Mrs. Fetiya,' which one of the following could be the most appropriate closing?

Answer: A

Yours faithfully is kept for letters that begin *Dear Sir* or *Dear Madam*, where the name is unknown. Yours obediently is old fashioned and out of use.

Rule: Name known: Yours sincerely. Name unknown: Yours faithfully.

Answer: A

Answer: D

Order the sentences by their signal words. *There are some reasons for students to drop out of school* is the topic sentence, so it opens. *One reason can be economic related cause* must come next, because *one reason* answers *some reasons*. *Schooling requires fulfilling the basic materials for learning* then explains why money matters. *Sickness could be the other reason* closes, because *the other reason* means the second one.

That order is b, d, a, c.

Note on this copy: the letters a, b, c and d were lost from the sentences when the paper was scanned. Read them as a, b, c, d in the order they are printed.

Rule: Follow the signposts: one reason comes before the other reason, and the topic sentence comes before both.

Answer: B

Find the topic sentence first: *Since its establishment in 2001, the African Union has had to grapple with lots of challenges*. It names the subject and the word *challenges*, so it opens the paragraph.

Then comes *One of the challenges ... is the different conflicts*, then the money problem introduced by *also*, and last the outcome introduced by *As a result*. That gives d, c, b, a.

Note on this copy: the letters a, b, c and d were lost from the sentences in the scan. Read them as a, b, c, d in the order they are printed.

Rule: A sentence beginning with *As a result* reports an outcome, so it can never open a paragraph.

Answer: A

Sentence d opens, because it announces the advice: if you want to succeed in a job interview, observe the following points. Sentence c starts with *This would help you*, so it comments on the step just described.

The order is d, b, a, c.

Rule: A sentence that opens with *this*, *that* or *once* points back, so it cannot stand first.

106. a. This shows how committed the African Union is towards ensuring durable peace and security in the continent. b. In other words, the commitment shown by the African Union towards peace and security is beyond any measure. c. There has been so many peace keeping missions deployed by the African Union in conflict zones across Africa. d. The peace keeping missions of the African Union have been widely acknowledged by the international community. (1)

Answer: B

Sentence c gives the plain fact: many peace keeping missions have been deployed. Sentence d adds that these missions have been acknowledged. Sentence a starts with *This shows*, so it interprets those facts, and sentence b starts with *In other words*, so it restates the interpretation and closes.

The order is c, d, a, b.

Rule: Facts come first, then what they show, then the restatement.
